They were all looking to make an impression on the hard-boiled judges from nearby Lackland AFB in the tall shadows of the Alamodome in San Antonio, Texas. They say everything is bigger in Texas, and in the city that has been made famous for its strong drill teams representing all branches of the armed services, the teams at this year's Air Force Western Championships were forced to either go big or go home!

In recent years, the members of the John Jay HS AFJROTC have flexed their muscles in both the Armed & Unarmed Divisions, picking up several overall titles for the Silver Eagles and Snap II drill teams. ARMED DIVISION

While the Silver Eagles from John Jay HS (San Antonio, TX) have been an omnipresent force at the NHSDTC for many years, their record of accomplishment at the Air Force Nationals event has been filled with only Championship and Runner-up crowns with the last two Overall titles. This year was no different as the Silver Eagles took the overall championship with ease as they swept through their competition with nothing but first place finishes. Their closest challengers were the always tough Centurion Guard

Several calls have already been taken to know that more than a few teams are gunning for the top slot at the 2011 event, including a few new West Coast schools looking to take the Silver Eagles down off their perch at next year's event to be held in Phoenix. Arizona!

UNARMED DIVISION

Much like their armed counterparts, the Snap II drill

team from John Jay HS have maintained pristine status as the team to beat in their division, and 2010 was another affirmation why that is the case. While they did not dominate like their counterparts, Snap II had impressive finishes throughout the competition (1st-Color Guard & Exhibition; 2nd-Regulation; 4th-Inspection). Hot on their heels was Silver Valor from Thomas C. Clark **HS** who came close to snapping the title from Snap II. With these two schools battling it out so closely in both divisions, this deep rooted rivalry looks to get better and better as time goes on.

his year's Air Force Eastern Division Championships were held in the fabulous Macon Centreplex in Macon, Georgia in mid-March. You could feel the electricity in the air as the nation's finest AFJROTC units east of the Mississippi River battled it out to see who among them would reign supreme.

ARMED DIVISION

For two straight years, the Falcons from Coventry HS (Coventry, RI) have clinched the overall title but the departure of drill legend MSG Dick LeBel would make it hard to stay on top with everyone gunning for you. The two-time champs were solid but slipped to 3rd place as a new champion was crowned in the form of the Ruff Ryders from Lackey HS (Indian Head, MD)! With trophy finishes in every event, they had enough to hold on for their first overall championship. Had it not been for a 10th place finish in Color Guard, this year's Runner-up, the Vikings from Spring Valley HS (Columbia, SC) would have taken the title with an impressive overall display! This division now appears wide open with so many competitve teams vying for gold. This year's nail biter is only a taste of what's to come in the near future!

UNARMED DIVISION

Always amazingly competitive and wideopen, the Eastern Unarmed Division did not disappoint. Much like the Armed Division, the previous year's champion was knocked completely out of the top two spots as the Raiders USA from East Paulding HS (Dallas, GA) made a huge impact taking home the big event trophies in 3 out of 4 events (1st-Exhibition; 3rd-Color Guard & Inspection). Also impressive was the overall Runner-Up finisher from Lackey HS (Indian Head, MD). The Ladies of Destruction just missed clinching the championship by a mere 30 points overall in this 4,000 point competition! Had they been able to place slightly higher in any one of their events, they would have taken BOTH tall trophies that they have been clawing after for many years.

Next year's Eastern Air Force Nationals heads north as the blue beasts from the east will invade the Prince George's Sports & Learning Complex in Landover, Maryland on March 25th, 2011! There have been more than a few naysayers when last year's Navy Nationals Champions, **Centennial HS**, clinched victory in the absence of long time National Champions **Flour Bluff HS**. However, those whispers would be silenced with the strongest overall competition field in the history of the "Navy Nationals" decending on Pensacola, Florida for a true battle royale among the finest Navy JROTC units in the nation in the Spring of 2010!

The event saw 26 schools representing the U.S. Navy go head-to-head with each other in what many consider the most well-rounded JROTC competition in the world. Not only does each school show tremendous drill provess in Basic, Color Guard, Exhibition, and UPI; but units must also prove their worth in both academic and athletic displays for a shot at overall excellence. Several schools have been in the top tier of this competition for the last few years, but if there's one thing we've seen at Navy Nationals, it is that absolutely anything is possible!

Long, tense, sweat-filled days made for a drained competition field. However, a quick shower and a bite to eat and the cadets and their near thousand spectators quickly filled the Blue Angels Atrium at the National Musem of Naval Aviation to hear the results of their tremendous efforts over the past two days. There to greet them was **RADM Joseph F. Kilkenny, USN, Commander, Naval Education & Training Command** (who also was regularly seen walking through the various competition areas throughout the event!) His inspirational speech filled the room with applause and a standing ovation. With excitement and eagerness pulsating to a palpable level throughout the entire hall, it was time to reveal the results of this year's NJROTC Nationals!

First up were the awards given for the Athletic events beginning with the individual medals. For the second year in a row in Curl-Ups, **Shawnee Mission North HS** (Kansas) showed a total and complete domination with 5 cadets in the top 10 for both male and female divisions, easily capturing the team Curl-Up trophy. The field was a bit more spread out for Push-Ups, but **Centennial HS** (Nevada) was able to come away with a victory by out-pushing **Shawnee Mission** by just 37 total push-ups! Nearby **Pine Forest HS** (Florida) from just down the road showed off their tremendous speed with a convincing victory in the Oval Relay by more than 6 seconds and an additional win in the Shuttle Relay, this time by less than 1 second! However, at the end of the day, there can be only one team with the top combination of strength and speed, and that team was **Centennial HS** who beat out **Shawnee Mission North HS** for the overall Athletic trophy. Not far behind was always strong **Winter Park HS** (Florida) who took 3rd place.

The mood changed inside the Musem as the ceremony shifted gears in an effort to highlight brains over braun and the Academic trophies at this year's Navy Nationals. This particular event is brutal as the gritty test is a custom-crafted exam that is designed to be the hardest curriculum test many of these cadets have ever faced! After all the pencils had been put away and the exams were graded, it was **Troy HS**

No clear favorite emerged as no less than five schools stayed in contention throughout!

(California) who managed to earn the bragging rights and the biggest of the Academic Trophies!

Everyone eagerly anticipated the results of the Drill portion of the event, especially with long time Navy Nationals favorite **Flour Bluff HS** (Texas) still in the mix with roughly 7 or 8 schools very much in the hunt for the overall title. However, it was made clear very early on that no one was there to play games as various schools received top honors for their drill prowess. **Shawnee Mission North HS** clinched a 1st place finish in Armed Basic & Color Guard, while **Northmont HS** (Ohio) grabbed victory in Unarmed Basic in a close battle with **Shawnee Mission North**. However, the cadets from **Flour Bluff** would not sit by for a title that was theirs for a decade previously as they had impressive 1st and 2nd place finishes in Armed & Unarmed Platoon Exhibition, respectively. Meanwhile, defending champs **Centennial HS** got their hands on several pieces of tall gold for drill including a 1st place trophy in Unarmed Platoon Exhibition. While many

In Unarmed Platoon Exhibition schools have long thought that the drill portion is a make or break point for the overall championship, the plot thickened as **Shawnee Mission North HS** took home the overall Drill trophy, making a clear favorite for the title of Navy Nationals champ still unapparent.

There was only one more event to appeal to as the crowd waited to see who among them would be crowned champion, and that was the point-laden Unit Personnel Inspection competition. While strength, knowledge, and drill prowess will take you far, it is the



high stakes world of "UPI" that is essential to score well to seriously compete for the overall award. So far three different schools had taken 1st place in three different categories. Would one of those schools step up to paint a clearer "big" picture or would another unit step up to muddy the waters and leave everyone in suspense? The answer came in the form of the latter as **George Bush HS** (Texas) demonstrated tremendous bearing and took home the Unit Personnel Inspection trophy. The crowd was left head scratching as they wondered, "Who is going to be the champion?"

The moment of truth had arrived as it was time to reveal who showed the most consistent performance throughout all components of this tremendous competition. RADM Kilkenny took the stage and started out by presenting **Troy HS** with their 5th place trophy. Next up was **Flour Bluff HS**, falling out of contention for the title, but still finishing strong with their 4th place finish.

Long-time Navy Nationals Runner-up **Boca Raton HS** was pushed back to 3rd place overall as it boiled down to the final two. Would the champions repeat, or would the hungry **Shawnee Mission North** cadets finally get their grip on the Overall Championship? In a wild finish, the NJROTC cadets from **Centennial HS** in Las Vegas, Nevada squeaked out a victory by a mere 3 points over Runner-Up **Shawnee Mission North**! The champions erupted into a frenzy as they clinched their 2nd consecutive title, cementing their status as the team to beat at this event.

This year's competition was the closest finish in the over 100 military competitions hosted by Sports Network International over the years. All of the top finishers made a push for the championship that was unprecedented and likely left each frustrated by just how close they had come. With so many national and local dignitaries on hand featuring members of the supporting **Navy League**, it was amazing to watch these veterans beam at the talented youngsters filled with so much energy and enthusiasm! Bringing anything less than your A-game to the Navy Nationals is simply not an option!

So the question is thrown - can **Centennial** hold on once more to solidify themselves as a true NJROTC dynasty? Don't bet against it! Secure yourself a spot at the 2011 Navy Nationals to watch the newest drama unfold for yourself - it should be another amazing, wild ride!

ARMED DIVISION

Coming off of a rather convincing victory at last year's Army Nationals, the **Blue Guard** from **Douglas MacArthur HS** were looking to successfully defend their championship against the many highly competitive schools in attendance. They were successful in their endeavors, taking the Overall Championships with top tier finishes in all events (1st-Inspection; 2nd-Regulation; 3rd-Color Guard & Exhibition). This year's victory was not as convincing as the **Maverick Guard** from **James Madison HS** missed the overall title by a mere 33 points, taking home the Runner-up trophy instead. here is always a fun and healthy debate when people discuss the origins of the high school "Raider" teams and where the best are found. While all agree these teams were loosely patterned after the more well-known college ARMY RANGER competitions, most disagree on where the competition is the most fierce. Certainly, the most well-known hotbed of Raider nationally is within the state of Georgia. Such a high percentage of units have a Raider team that there is a competition going on somewhere almost weekly and the talent level is always quite high! That said, in the past several years a solid case can be made that the Tennessee/ Kentucky area is equal to the Georgia influence led by such powers as **Red Bank HS, Campbell County HS**, and **Hendersonville HS**. New York/New Jersey is not as well known when it comes to Raider but **Francis Lewis HS, Colts Neck HS** and others take a backseat to no one when it comes to Raider talent. Certainly **Grissom HS** in Huntsville, Alabama carries the state flag proudly with their awesome Raider unit that wins high honors at most every meet they attend.

So exactly WHERE the best Raider teams come from is a matter for great discussion, much like where the best college football is played or what is the greatest car ever built. But one thing is for sure, the BEST collection of all-service Raider talent gathers every year historically on the first weekend in November in Molena, Georgia at the Raider Nationals!

A crisp Fall day in November 2009 brought schools together from ten states buoyed by a huge number from neighboring cities in Georgia to chase the elusive quest that is a top finish at the Raider Nationals. The night prior to the event, nearly one thousand cadets and instructors were scattered between sleeping in beds at home, cots & tents in the woods at the competition site, and even a few nearby hotel rooms! These dedicated young JROTC men and women rolled out the next day ready to battle, game faces firmly in place. Small, tight-knit groups of male, female and mixed teams that run, carry, wade, pull, climb, crawl and build to complete near-impossible physical tasks through strength, agility, teamwork and sheer mental and physical toughness make Raider a great sport to watch and be a part of! The crisp Georgia air left cadets bundled for warmth in the morning but as the sun came out, the jackets slowly gave way to shorts and t-shirts for the hearty among them.

FEMALE DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

Eleven hardcore female Raider teams were ready for anything as they looked to bring home bragging rights to their school from the Raider Nationals. As usual, the **Patreetes** of **Francis Lewis HS** from Fresh Meadows, New York looked to be the favorite as they have jumped into Raider in a big way. Fired up as a result of their loss to last year's champions the **Grissom Femurs** from **Grissom HS** for the 2008 title, the **Patreetes** nearly swept the event, taking 1st place in every Raider event except the Rope Bridge in which they took 2nd. While they couldn't quite match the unbelievable performance put on by **Francis Lewis, Grissom HS** powered their way to Runner-up performance, taking 2nd place in the APFT, Team 5K, and CCR; 3nd in the Gauntlet; and 5th in the Rope Bridge event. They needed every point as both **Richmond Hill HS** (Richmond Hill, Georgia) and **Cedar Shoals HS** (Athens, Georgia) were in 3nd and 4th place respectively right behind the top overall finishers. Another notable performance was turned in by **Paulding County HS** (Dallas, Georgia) who nabbed a 3nd place in the exciting Rope Bridge event. These all female teams have been engaged in a heated rivalry for a few years now. Will they continue to duke it out amongst themselves in 2010, or will another team throw their name into the mix? MIXED DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

The Mixed Division always brings an element of teamwork and strategy that makes this division best captured by the most talented and smartest teams! Twenty teams were competing for the overall title but after only a few events, it was clear that the field was being dominated by two kingpins. Coming out on top were the **Smith-Cotton Tigers** from **Smith-Cotton HS** in Sedalia, Missouri. These hard working cadets were able to outperform all of their competitors by getting three 1st place finishes (APFT, 5K, Gauntlet) and two 2nd place finishes (CCR, Rope Bridge). Event Judging

All judges at the NHSDTC maintain a strong background in military drill. Judges are fully qualified military personnel representing all four branches of the service. Judges are given extensive judging manuals in advance of the event, as well as a full on-site briefing on the eve of the competition. The Nationals' judges are extremely motivated and give a 110% effort. This remains a major reason why so many teams look to end their drill season at **"The World's Most Famous Beach."**

Competition Events

The NHSDTC maintains two competition levels. The **Challenge Level** event is designed for drill teams who wish to be part of the Nationals experience while competing against similarly talented schools at a less intense skill level than the Masters Level. The Challenge Level maintains Armed (demilitarized weapons only) & Unarmed divisions. All schools are also encouraged to consider entering "standalone" Color Guard units into the exciting Open Level Color Guard competition also held on Saturday during the Challenge Level event.

Schools may enter multiple complete teams in different divisions at the Nationals **as long as no cadet competes for more than one team**. Therefore, schools entering both an armed and unarmed team may do so, but the two teams **must have separate cadets for each team**. This rule allows maximum cadet participation without adding multiple school entries utilizing the same cadets.

<u>All Masters Level</u> Armed units are allowed one entry (per team) in both Solo & Dual Exhibition. Unarmed Masters units can enter one pair in Unarmed Dual Ex. ***Select Challenge Level** cadets may also be accepted into these events! Teams can petition for a 2nd entry slot if desired. Also, <u>ALL CADETS</u> are urged to compete in their level's Armed & Unarmed Knockout Drills. **NOTE**: No "knockout fee" is charged to participate in this event.

NHSDTC Event Specifics

With 1st place finishes in Regulation & Color Guard and a close 2nd place finish in Team Exhibition, not even a tough finish in Inspection could stop utter dominance at this year's event. These Army JROTC cadets have demonstrated their worth in the drill universe, and they are hungry for a run at the competition in the Masters level next year! These fine young cadets from the "Show-Me State" sure showed every spectator what it takes to be a champion!

Taking home the Runner-up trophy this year with consistent performances in nearly all of the events was **Hubbard High School** from Chicago, Illinois. They placed 4th in Regulation, Color Guard, and Exhibition, and even managed to edge out this year's champs in Inspection. With such strong performances throughout, the **H-Squad** showed that they are A-List competitors and look to take next year's competition by storm.

Several other schools had very impressive showings and debuts this year. **Colts Neck Guard** from New Jersey took 3rd overall in only their second year of competition, while new kids on the Nationals block **Ben Davis HS Golden Eagles** from Indianapolis, Indiana showed their Marine Corps gung-ho spirit by capturing 4th place overall and a very impressive 1st place finish in Inspection. Rounding out the top five is **Rutland HS's Mid Georgia Leathernecks**, ensuring that the Marine Corps was well represented at the top tier of this year's event.

2010 OPEN LEVEL COLOR GUARD COMPETITION

Open Level Color Guard is the only division at "The Nationals" where you can see the most seasoned of veterans taking on the greenest of newcomers. Some units bring only a four-person color guard to Daytona while other units have entire teams competing in a variety of divisions and decide to bring an additional color guard. Regardless of the why or where, this huge division always provides a unique competition for all who participate.

With a near-legendary reputation, the cadets from **Alamo Heights HS** showed everyone what Color Guard is all about. With two separate teams competing in this division, these Army JROTC Cadets from deep in the heart of Texas managed to take home two finishes in the top five. **The Mulettes**, National Champs from two years ago, came away with the crown this year while their counterparts, the **Lady Mules**, came away with a 5th place finish. These two teams were separated by less than 100 points in this 1200 point total category, and there were still three teams in between! **Alamo Heights HS** is showing us year in and year out what it takes to dominate this division and should be looked upon as a good model for all teams looking to be successful when they come to Daytona.

In similar fashion, the 2006 champion Lancaster High School Army JROTC unit had two teams finish in the top ten. Both the Black Guard and the Orange Guard were hot on the heels of the Mulettes and Lady Mules, respectively, taking 2nd place and 6th place finishes. The consistent performances of these two units is developing quite a rivalry, and it will be interesting to see if there are any teams out there formidable enough to take them down in the coming years.

Filling out the rest of the top 5 at this year's Open Level Color Guard event were the **North Miami Beach Sr. High School Chargers** (3rd) and the **Lady Broncos** (4th) from **Brandeis High School**, two teams who were equally well-represented in the Masters level of the NHSDTC.

Interested in competing against scores of color guards from across the country? Be sure to apply early to nail down a spot in this highly competitive division. Entry spaces are limited to approximately 45 teams, so don't hesitate when applying to get in on the action! UNARMED DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

With 35 schools competing, not including last year's National Champs in the Masters Level and the absence of last year's Runner-up, this year's NHSDTC Unarmed Challenge Level event was wide-open for a team looking to make an impact. That team came blowing in hard as the **Raging Storm** from **Hopkins County HS** in the heart of the Bluegrass State (Madisonville, KY) took home a decisive win, leaving all the other teams to sort through the debris left behind by the Storm. With 1st place finishes in Regulation, Color Guard, and Team Exhibition, not even a tough finish in Inspection could break up this category 5 hurricane to keep them from achieving overall victory. Congratulations to this outstanding Air Force unit on a well-deserved victory.

> Hot on the heels of the National Champions was **Colts Neck HS** from **Colts Neck, New Jersey**. In only their second year of competing at the World's Most Famous Beach, these fine Navy cadets showed off their impressive knowledge and bearing with a blowout performance in Inspection (1st), beating their nearest competitors by almost 200 points! When you combine that with a 2nd place finish in Regulation, the **Pride of Colts Neck** appeared ready to brave the onslaught of the **Raging Storm**. However, their performances in Color Guard and Team Exhibition kept them from taking the overall title. Be on the lookout for these New Jersey natives next year as they face the big dogs in the Masters level in 2011.

> This division was filled with close finishes, and here's how the rest of the top five shakes down: the Warriors from West Orange HS grabbed 3rd place, Lady Wranglers from West Mesquite HS took 4th overall, and the Gold Tigers from Smith-Cotton HS placed 5th in a bitter fight to the finish. These three teams were all separated by less than 30 points total, a testament to just how competitive this year's Unarmed Division at the Challenge Level Event really was! Other impressive showings include Caddo Parish Magnet HS (3rd-Color Guard) and the Untouchables from Oxon Hill HS (2nd-Exhibition). Congratulations to all the fine competitors at this vear's NHSDTC Challenae Level Event!

> Every year, many competitive programs that are well deserving of a competition slot in the Challenge competition are left out due to the sheer volume of applicants! Schools that plan to attend the NHSDTC should ensure that they meet the early December deadline for entry submission to increase the likelihood that they will be vying for the title at "The Nationals" in 2011!

CONGRATULATIONS TO ALL OF THE SCHOOLS WHO MAKE UP THE CHALLENGE LEVEL COMPETITION



First LaSalle Military had their run in the 80's, then San Antonio stormed the stage led by Theodore Roosevelt and Winston Churchill throughout the '90s and into the new century. Flour Bluff HS then dominated along with Fern Creek HS into the recent era in their divisions, but now many think Francis Lewis HS high school may be on the cusp of something just as big!

As the dawn approaches on an early Sunday morning in May of 2010, hundreds of cadets have already sprung from their racks on the shores of Daytona Beach, Florida putting the finishing touches on their uniforms, shaving their faces, braiding their hair, and preparing for two days of the most grueling competition they've ever experienced. The many hundreds of hours and the many gallons of blood, sweat, and tears they've shed in the preceding 363 days of the year all come down to this: two days, five separate events, and one chance to be the best.

Pressure? You better believe there's pressure. That pressure is the very foundation of what has given the National High School Drill Team Championships its esteemed reputation as the finest gathering of high school athletes that this country has to offer. In no other place will you see a gathering of such tremendous talent in one place to determine who truly is the best in their sport. This year marked the 28th Annual competition, and the stakes were as high as they've ever been. With dozens of the sport's teams chomping at the bit to display their own excellence, there was never any question that this year's Nationals would be anything short of fantastic.

In conjunction with the growth of the Ocean Center, the Nationals, too, has grown in size. This year's PX area was filled with cadets, instructors, and spectators alike constantly heading up to gather information or to pick up souvenirs to commemorate their time at the Nationals. The new indoor practice areas were bustling and the 20+ meeting rooms in the Ocean Center made it possible for some teams to have a space to make into a relaxing home. In addition, the Nationals Village exhibitor's area featured a little something for everyone, highlighted by the jaw-dropping trailer anchored by the U.S. Navy and the U.S. Army Marksmanship display, both featuring examples of the coolest military technology wrapped in fun for anybody looking to let loose while not on the drill floor. With all of these fine additions tacked on to the National High School Drill Team Championships, the ambience of the event can only be described as breathtaking.

This year's competition was highlighted by the most difficult Inspections in recent national's history. With everyone looking to dethrone last year's champs Francis Lewis (Demilitarized), Flour Bluff (Unarmed), and Fern Creek (Alternative Arms); the slightest mistake in any event could make a world of difference. Throughout the entirety of the competition, you could cut the tension in the Ocean Center with a knife. Would last year's champions be denied, or would these apparent dynasties tighten their grip on their respective divisions, leaving everyone else behind once more?

ALTERNATIVE ARMS HIGHLIGHTS

In its storied history, Sports Network International has been witness to many dynasties and would be dynasties. In the early years, it was LaSalle Military Academy in the Demilitarized Arms Division. In the late 90s and early 2000's, it was Black Watch on the male side and Theodore Roosevelt on the female side. But never in any division has there ever been a more consistent, unstoppable force than the female cadets from just outside Louisville for the last 11 years! has been able to get their hands on that big piece of hardware that sits on the middle of the stage at the Nationals Awards Gala each year. Some have come close....very close! MCJROTC unit **Palm Bay HS** from Palm Bay, Florida and Army JROTC unit **Winter Springs HS** in Winter Springs, Florida nearly did it a few times. Unfortunately for the rest of this year's competitors, there was no Cinderella in the 2010 storybook as the **Lady Leathernecks** clinched their 11th consecutive National Championship! With three 1st place finishes in Regulation, Squad & Platoon Exhibition, and two 2nd place finishes in Inspection & Color Guard, Fern Creek

The Lady Leathernecks from Fern Creek HS

arrived on the Nationals drill scene and took the division by storm. Since then, no one else

separated themselves from their nearest competitors by roughly 400 points! With a new instructor taking over the reigns this year at Fern Creek HS, we will see whether this drill powerhouse can be stopped in 2011, or will they continue to dominate this division for another decade to come?

The battle for the Runner-up trophy was a brutal one that boiled down to two teams, the Lady Redhawks from Seneca HS (Louisville, Kentucky) and the Golden Bears from Winter Springs HS (Winter Springs, Florida). With 1st place finishes in Inspection and Color Guard, considered two of the most difficult events at the Nationals, the Golden Bears looked well poised for a run at the ten-time champions. A solid 2nd place finish in Platoon Exhibition and 3rd place finish in Regulation put them in position but a disappointing 5th place finish in Squad Exhibition left them left them in a dogfight for 2nd place overall with Fern Creek HS's arch rival Seneca HS. While the Seneca Lady Redhawks may not have taken 1st place in any event, their consistent performance was enough to edge out the Golden Bears by a mere 11 points for the Runner-up trophy! Seneca was impressive in all their performances: Regulation & Squad Exhibition (2nd), Platoon Exhibition (4th) and Inspection (5th). Their point totals managed to eke out a victory over Winter Springs HS, but you had better believe that next year the Golden Bears have their sights set on both the Lady Redhawks and the champs from Fern Creek as they look to take over this highly competitive division.

Other notable finishes in this division include **Bellevue West HS** (3rd-Platoon Exhibition), J.H. Reagan HS (3rd-Inspection & Squad Exhibition), and **Carroll HS** (3rd-Color Guard, 4th-Squad Exhibition), and an amazing solo exhibition routine by Cadet Phillips from the **Carroll HS Golden Knights** and the tandem dual team from the **Braden River HS**, Cadets Bowman & Poirier. DrillNATION cannot wait to see what they all have in store for us at the 2011 National High School Drill Team Championships!

UNARMED DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

Much like the ladies from Fern Creek in the Alternative Arms Division, the **Sea Hawks** from **Flour Bluff HS** in Corpus Christi, Texas have become synonymous with the Unarmed Division. Since capturing their first national title in 2000, they have been a veritable force to be reckoned with and have held on to the six foot trophy every year since 2003. However, being the champion from a fairly small school also leaves you in the crosshairs of the many rival schools vying for your title. With so many targets on their backs and with the tenacity of the Runner-up from the last 2 years, the **Patriot Pride** from **Francis Lewis HS**, snapping at their heels every step of the way, could the **Sea Hawks** hold on to their title as we began a new decade of Nationals excellence?

These two teams went at it like two prizefighters in a heavyweight bout. However, when the last bell was rung and the judges' scores had been tallied, it was unanimous. The brawlers from Fresh Meadows, New York had done the unthinkable as the **Francis Lewis HS Patriot Pride** Unarmed Drill Team lay claim to this year's National Championship! With three astounding 1st place finishes in Color Guard, Flight & Element Exhibition, **Patriot Pride** became an early favorite for this year's title. These fine young Army JROTC cadets have shown everyone that no team is safe in this division, and their hunger for victory was satiated in a bravado performance on the shores of Daytona Beach.

Though dazed from their brutal battle with **Francis Lewis**, the ladies of the **Flour Bluff HS Sea Hawks** managed to stay in the top two of this division for the eleventh consecutive year with great performances across the board. While the Runner-Ups did not place first in any individual event, they looked ever-impressive throughout the competition, especially in Flight (2nd) and Element (4th) Exhibition. However, even the Runner-up title didn't come easy this year as another drill force, the always strong **Blue Angels** from **Douglas MacArthur HS** (San Antonio, TX) applied pressure and just missed grabbing a big trophy by 11 points on the 6,000 point scale! With a 1st place finish in Inspection and a 2nd place finish in Element Exhibition, these Army JROTC cadets showed the Navy JROTC **Sea Hawks** (and everyone else) that they mean business.

Other notable finishes this year included the **Riderettes** from **Theodore Roosevelt HS** (2nd-Inspection, 3rd-Element Exhibition), **Winston Churchill HS** (2nd-Regulation, 3rd-Inspection, 5th-Squad Exhibition), and **Brandeis HS** (1st-Regulation, 3rd-Flight Exhibition). In the Dual Exhibition event, Cadets Arevalo & Ho from the **Patriot Pride** managed to edge out the hard-charging representatives of the **Rahway HS Lady Devil Pups**, Cadets Almeida & Almeida, by a single point for first place! In such a tight division with so many good schools, next year's Unarmed melee is looking to be another nail biter.

DEMILITARIZED ARMS DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

In what many consider to be the most exhilarating and unpredictable division of the National High School Drill Team Championships, titles are often won by margins so small that even the slightest mistake in any event can have crippling effects. In the last three years, the titles of National Champions and Runner-ups have gone to some combination of four schools (Francis Lewis, Douglas MacArthur, Rahway, and Flour Bluff), with no repeat of the same combination. However, in that time, the mighty Patriot Guard have surged to the upper echelon of the division with two National Championships. They have also dominated nearly every other competition they've attended in recent years, winning overall championships at the National Raider Challenge Championships and the U.S. Army Cadet Command Eastern Championships several times over and secured the top spot in 2009's Demilitarized Arms Division at the NHSDTC. It may be too early to call them a dynasty, but they have the formula and the tools to continue their dominance for years to come. Would anyone be able to challenge this seemingly unstoppable juggernaut for this year's overall championship?

With conviction in their voices, the Army JROTC cadets from the heart of Fresh Meadows, New York answered that question with a resounding and appropriate, "fuhgeddaboutit." The **Patriot Guard** absolutely dominated this year's competition by taking home trophies in all 5 events. Three first place finishes in Inspection, Regulation, and Color Guard, a 4th place in Squad Exhibition, and a 5th place in Platoon

Exhibition were more than enough to separate **Francis Lewis HS** from their nearest competitors by a solid 200+ points! Watch out DrillNATION because it looks like the **Patriot Guard** is here to stay.

Always a top tier competitor but several years removed from their last run at the top two spots at Nationals, the **Silver Eagles** from **John Jay HS** (San Antonio, TX) came surging back into contention by taking home this year's Runner-Up trophy. They edged out last year's Runner-Up, **Douglas MacArthur HS Blue Guard**, with top placements in Squad Exhibition (1st), Color Guard & Regulation (3rd), and Inspection (5th). Solidifying a spot at the top for Air Force JROTC units everywhere, the **Silver Eagles** have poured concrete into the reputation foundation as being the finest Air Force drill program in the country.

Other notable finishes in this exciting division include 2008 National Champions **Rahway HS** (2nd-Platoon Exhibition), the **Lynn English Bulldogs** (2nd-Inspection & Regulation), **Grant HS** (4th-Regulation, 5th Color Guard), the **Fern Creek Leathernecks** (1st-Platoon Exhibition), **Flour Bluff** (4th-Inspection) and the **Flanagan Rifles** from **Marmion Academy** (3rd-Squad & Platoon Exhibition). Taking home the coveted Demilitarized Arms Solo Exhibition Championship trophy was Cadet O'Leary from **Vero Beach HS**, and taking home the Dual Championships were Cadets Sevidal & Hanuna from **Farrington HS** in Honolulu, Hawaii!

On the final night of the NHSDTC each year, all of the teams, instructors, and spectators get dressed in their best and file into the transformed Ocean Center for the Masters Level Awards Gala. This event is full of panache as Master of Ceremonies, Justin Gates, leads us through a magical evening filled with suspense, excitement, and some of the finest speakers eager to reach out to the attendees of this great event. This year's ceremony was highlighted by a stellar performance by the Navy Ceremonial Drill Team and speeches from U.S. Army Cadet Command Deputy Commanding General, **Brigadier General Arnold Gordon-Bray** and Savannah State University Navy ROTC Commanding Officer, **Captain Kent V. Flowers**. In addition, there were some highly touching moments as the National High School Drill Team Championships honored United States Army **Sergeant Amanda Older**, a former JROTC cadet and Nationals competitor from **James Madison HS** who has battled with cancer in recent years. The Nationals also bid farewell to one of the finest coaches in the

history of JROTC drill as MGvSqt Dunlapp from Fern Creek High School took the stage one last time before his impending retirement. Without a doubt, this year's ceremony (which was also broadcast live for the first time on DrillNATION.net) will go down as one of the most memorable ceremonies in Sports Network's long and

storied history.

As the National High School Drill Team Championships approaches its milestone 30th anniversary, it seems like an ideal opportunity to pause for reflection. Not only to look back at the cradle of JROTC drill excellence that gave birth to the Nationals, but to take an honest assessment of the current state of the Drill Nation.

Sports Network International will forever be indebted to the cadets of New York's La Salle Military Academy, who will be remembered for being as cocky as they were talented. The La Salle Rifles took the championship title in 1983 and went on to clinch a record six more overall victories throughout the 80s and 90s. Without theirs skills and their swagger, Nationals might never have attained its mystique as quickly and enduringly as it did. Their championships were all the more astonishing given their program's structure, with cadets in charge to lead and train the team with minimal adult instruction.

John Pisa-Relli, who competed in the first two events as a member of LSR, attended the 25th anniversary event, and had this to say: "As good as we thought we were way back then - and for our time we were among the best - we couldn't hold a candle to today's dominant teams. They would have kicked our butts, for sure. Drill has come so far in terms of technique and precision --- it's really quite breathtaking what today's generation of young men and women are capable of doing on the drill deck." But what struck John when he came back to the Nationals in 2007 was something more timeless than timely. "While the technical advances in drill are breathtaking to be sure," he added, "I was most impressed by the patriotism, enthusiasm, esprit de corps, and good character on display. Their talent is a reflection of their values, just as it was back in 1983."

The rest, as they say, is history. The decades unfolded and drill has experienced a meteoric rise as a result of many obvious (and a few not so apparent) reasons. The primary explosion came guite simply from exposure. The Nationals has allowed hundreds of programs and tens of thousands of cadets to see the best drill has to offer up close and personal. And with the convenience of the DVD series and online sites such as Youtube. drill excellence is literally accessible to the world. The astonishing Hawaiian style was brought to the mainland. Black Watch's Texas influence traveled to the northeast. Marmion's (Illinois) precision was studied in the south. Rahway's (New Jersev) intensity made it to the west coast. Francis Lewis' (New York) precision was dissected throughout the east coast. And Fern Creek's (Kentucky) Lady prowess was analyzed by every female armed team in the country.

The second reason for the fast-paced growth in drill lies where influence is born: at the top. Instructors saw what was possible and set the standard that their teams would have to achieve. They accepted nothing less than the absolute best their teams were capable of. In modern times, a cadet-led team like La Salle would have an uphill battle against today's best instructors that get to school at 0600, leave at 1800, and are commited year around to making their team a national power.

The exponential rise in drill talent is also eroding the realm of the dynasty.

The final reason for both the growth and innovation in drill lives in plain sight - it's in the hands of the cadets. The artistry and creativity at play in the drill world today is nothing short of staggering. In years past, routines were firmly rooted, never to be anything more than tweaked from year to year. Now, cadets are anxious to mix it up, to try something new that pushes the envelope. And it's the cutting edge instructor that allows them the room to grow and advance their skills and refine their style.

The exponential rise in drill talent is also eroding the realm of the dynasty. It's getting more difficult with each passing year to dominate in your division. There's simply too much talent on the floor of the Nationals to walk into the Ocean Center with the misplaced arrogance that you're a lock to take home any trophy, let alone the big one. As good as your team is, there are a dozen other programs working just as hard as you are.

In the Demilitarized Division alone, there have been four different champions in the past five years. Not long ago, Texas was king of the universe. But as the sport evolves, so do programs throughout the country. Even so, San Antonio is still the epicenter of the drill universe. In 2010, their programs took home a staggering 24 of the 54 trophies in their divisions!

There are many programs that work tirelessly in preparation for Nationals, but have never finished in the top 10. One might ask, why keep pursuing a trophy that you don't seem likely to win? To the outside world that question might seem baffling. But to any instructor that is putting in the time, standing post at endless practices, and guiding cadets from their first day of freshman year to their graduation as a senior, it is the simplest question of all to answer.

It's the pursuit that makes the difference. Setting a goal (such as Nationals) builds focus and requires determination, teamwork, commitment and a level of camaraderie that doesn't happen casually. You can't teach someone how to be exceptional without giving them a reason to be. Excellence doesn't happen in a vacuum. It happens after hundreds and hundreds of hours of first trying and failing, then trying and succeeding and finally trying and excelling. By allowing their cadets to work towards the mastery of drill, with the goal of Nationals as a shining beacon in what can be a very long, challenging year of ups and downs, these instructors are setting their cadets up for success in life.

Oftentimes, the pursuit of a goal can become so singular, that the benefits surrounding it can get lost. During the Masters Level Awards Ceremony, one wonders if the cadets present truly grasp just how far they have come in such a short time. Do the adults present appreciate the greater picture that is unfolding before them? Each program accepted the challenge to succeed and worked endlessly to achieve it. With or without that trophy, the goal was accomplished. The victory was attained. As Baron deCoubertin, the founder of the modern day Olympics once said, "The most important thing in the Olympic Games is not winning but taking part; the essential thing in life is not conquering but fighting well."



SNI remains honored to serve as guardian of the Nationals spirit. We will protect it and encourage it and hopefully guide it to even greater heights as we attempt to age gracefully. And like any lady, when we're asked how old we are, we'll simply smile and say that we are, "29 and holding."

JROTC: An Impact that Can Last a Lifetime

nce upon a time, there was a young kid from Rahway. New Jersey who never excelled at anything. He had no clear sense of direction nor did he have the discipline necessary to make him successful in his life. He went to high school, still floundering in the life he'd always lived until something amazing happened. In his sophomore year he joined the MCJROTC program at Rahway HS. It was the best decision he'd ever made, and it set him up for a successful track in life.

My name is Matt Graifer, the newest member of the Sports Network International team and all those years ago, that kid was me. I joined a program with a tremendous national reputation, and for the first time ever, I gave something my heart and soul. I became



the CO of my unit, Commander of my drill team, and won the National Runnerup trophy as a Regulation Commander at the 2004 Nationals. What JROTC gave me was a sense of camaraderie I'd never experienced before or since, true leadership skills, confidence, and the discipline necessary to carry me through both a baccalaureate and master's degree. I've done many things since my time as a cadet, and never a moment has gone by that I didn't think about how it all might not have been possible had it not been for my time as a Devil Pup. I never expected to be called back to JROTC, but I found myself working with SNI for a graduate project, which ultimately led to the opportunity to join their team. So here I am, fully entrenched in the world of JROTC once again, doing everything I can to make our events, products, and the experiences we offer to the cadets bigger and better.

Beyond the advantages that are found in JROTC that can set a cadet up for life, there is often a sense of wanting to "give back" and stay involved in the drill world following graduation. Several former cadets have found unique ways to bring their expertise back to the schools. Andrea Bryant is a California native that attended Moreno Valley HS and graduated in 2003. While she never attended the Nationals as a JROTC cadet, Moreno Valley was widely regarded as the best drill team on the west coast. However, Bryant's claim to fame in the drill world aside from being the Commander of her drill team was when she was chosen to train Hillary Duff for her role in the hit Disney film, Cadet Kelly. "They originally were looking at Moreno Valley to be the rival school in the film, but our team was too small. But they wanted trainers to work with Hillary Duff. So the unarmed commander and I went to Hollywood to train Hillary for about four days, and they picked Rahway to be the rival school," recalled Bryant.

She went on to Norwich University where she participated in the Corps of Cadets and was a member of the Shock Platoon. She studied Business Management and graduated in 2007. "Norwich molded me into the business woman I am today," said Bryant. She has also been a competitor at the ISIS World Championships for several years, keeping her passion for drill alive and well.

Bryant is currently the manager of Sytable Web Design, and while her passion lies in web design, her talents are certainly not contained there. Flexing



her business muscle, Bryant founded For The Art, a clothing company for drillers that features cutting-edge designs that blend the art of drill with pop culture. This year she is expanding her business to include Unarmed Drill with the "As One" clothing line. As if her schedule wasn't full enough. Bryant shares her drill expertise by coaching local teams to make them competitive at the national level. When asked why it was important for her give back to the drill world, Bryant said, "[I do it] because of what drill gave to me. It put me on a path that was better than how I might have turned out without it. I

want to give back and make a similar path available to current cadets. I think

it's very important to increase drill's exposure to the public for acceptance and understanding of what it is and what it can do." She still drills about three times

a week when she gets a break from her responsibilities. In the future, she looks to create a website for drillers where they can access instructional videos to help them and their teams improve. Her one piece of advice to cadets today is. "Know that there is drill beyond high school. It is what you make of it, big or small. You can coach, you can compete as a soloist, you can start your own company...You can grow with drill, so stick with it!"



While many proud cadets scoff at the idea of mingling with cadets from rival schools, it is becoming more common for the gaps between rivals to be bridged through the common love of drill. A great example is the dynamic duo of Jaclyn Stewart, Flour Bluff HS '08 and Bill Owen, Orange Park HS '07. Their friendship came out of the heat of rivalry but grew into a lasting camaraderie as they share their continued passion for drill. With his background as Battalion, Drill Team and Rifle Commander, Owen helped make Orange Park nationally competitive and went on to compete as a soloist in both Nationals and ISIS. During Stewart's tenure at Flour Bluff, she commanded her unarmed team to a National Championship. Their first shared drill experience came as Platoon Leaders at the Nationals Drill Camp where they guided both novice and experienced cadets to greatness. Since graduation, they have gone on to higher education, with Owen pursuing a degree in Criminal Justice and a commission as a Marine Corps officer and Stewart working towards her degree in graphic design along with serving her country in the U.S. Navy Reserves.

As if that wasn't enough, they are busy being two of the most active alumni giving back to the drill world through their budding business venture **Competitive Outcomes**. After years of helping their alumni schools with training cadets, they have branched out to offer their services to schools from all over the country. Schools enlist their help to develop their drill talent from Inspection to Exhibition (and everything in between), all created specifically to meet the needs of the team and their ability to learn. Along with fine-tuning skills, they work with the style and imagination of the cadets to create new Exhibition routines. Owen was even flown out to work with the Trinidad & Tobago Cadet Force to improve their drill prowess! Together they are a force to be reckoned with. "It's about the family, the camaraderie, and the bonding. I'd never had anything like that before. I want to keep doing it," remarked Stewart.

"It's what we love doing," said Owen. "JROTC made me a better person. It solidified my desire to join the military and made me likely to succeed," reflected Owen who hopes one day to run a JROTC unit of his own after retirement from the military. As for some free advice, Owen was quick to offer, "Give it your all every step of the way. When you're done and you look back, you want

to be able to say you gave it everything you had."

Four different success stories from all walks of life with the common thread of JROTC that changed us for the better and set us all up for successful paths in life. Everyone knows JROTC will make you a better citizen, better leader, and a better person. Where will your experience in Junior ROTC take you after high school? The sky is truely the limit!

The Mighty Blue Guard Performs for Texas Governor

The current Army West Overall Champion and annual NHSDTC Masters Level top finisher Guard from Douglas Blue MacArthur HS was invited recently to perform in the Austin



Convention Center for the National Annual Convention of the Army and Air National Guard hosted by Texas Governor Rick Perry. In addition to their awe-inspiring performance in front of 4,000 senior military (including 170 general officers), back for next year's competition.
